AN ORDINANCE LEVYING TAXES FOR THE FISCAL YEAR BEGINNING

JULY 1, 2023 AND ENDING JUNE 30, 2024

WHEREAS, the City of Urbana ("City") is a home rule unit of local government pursuant

to Article VII, Section 6, of the Illinois Constitution, 1970, and may exercise any power and perform

any function pertaining to its government and affairs, including the power to tax; and

WHEREAS, Section 8-3-1 of the Illinois Municipal Code (65 ILCS 5/8-3-1) provides that

the corporate authorities may levy and collect taxes for corporate purposes; and

WHEREAS, on June 26, 2023, the corporate authorities passed Ordinance No. 2023-06-019,

adopting the annual budget for the City for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 2023 and ending June 30,

2024; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to Section 8-2-9.4 of the Illinois Municipal Code (65 ILCS 5/8-2-9.4)

and Sections 2-113 and 2-132 of the Urbana City Code, such passage of the annual budget by the

corporate authorities was in lieu of passage of the annual appropriation ordinance otherwise required

by the Illinois Municipal Code; and

WHEREAS, the corporate authorities find that the corporate purposes of the City are served

by levying upon all property subject to taxation within the City, as that property is assessed and

equalized for state and county purposes for the 2023 tax levy year, the respective amounts set forth in

this Ordinance, which such amounts are deemed necessary to defray the related expenses and liabilities

for all such corporate purposes of the City as have been appropriated for such purposes in the annual

budget; and

WHEREAS, at 7:00 p.m. on Monday, December 4, 2023, the corporate authorities held a

public hearing on their intent to adopt a tax levy that is 9.66% more than the prior year's final aggregate

Law (35 ILCS 200/18-70), after due and proper notice of such public hearing was given by publication in *The News-Gazette* on Friday, November 24, 2023.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED by the City Council of the City of Urbana, Illinois, as follows:

### Section 1.

The total amount of appropriations for all corporate purposes, which are legally made to be collected from the tax levy of the current fiscal year of the City of Urbana, is hereby ascertained to be the sum of \$10,265,792.

### Section 2.

The sum of \$10,265,792 being the total of budgeted appropriations heretofore legally made which are to be collected from the tax levy of the current fiscal year of the City of Urbana for all corporate purposes of said City, is hereby levied upon all taxable property subject to taxation for the current year.

The specific amounts as levied for the various funds heretofore named are separately included herein by being placed in separate columns under the heading "To Be Raised by Tax Levy" which appears over the same, the tax so levied being for the current fiscal year of the City of Urbana and for the said budgeted appropriation to be collected from said tax levy, the total of which has been ascertained as aforesaid and being as follows:

### Section 3.

This Ordinance is adopted pursuant to the procedures set forth in the Illinois Municipal Code, except that any tax rate limitation or other substantive limitations as to tax levies in the Illinois Municipal Code in conflict with this Ordinance shall not be applicable to this Ordinance pursuant to Article VII, Section 6, of the Illinois Constitution, 1970.

### Section 4.

There is hereby certified to the County Clerk of Champaign County, Illinois, the several sums aforesaid, \$10,265,792, constituting said total amount the City of Urbana requires to be raised by taxation for the current fiscal year of the City.

### Section 5.

The invalidity of any section or provision of this Ordinance hereby passed and approved shall not invalidate other sections or provisions thereof.

### Section 6.

This Ordinance shall not be construed to affect any suit or proceeding pending in any court, or any rights acquired, or a liability incurred, or any cause or causes of action acquired or existing prior to the effective date of this Ordinance; nor shall any right or remedy of any character be lost, impaired, or affected by this Ordinance.

### Section 7.

This Ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after its passage. The City Clerk is directed to file a certified copy of this Ordinance with the Champaign County Clerk on or before the last Tuesday in December.

This Ordinance is hereby passed by the affirmative vote, the "ayes" and "nays" being called, of a majority of the corporate authorities (5 of 8 votes) of the City of Urbana, Illinois, at a meeting of said corporate authorities.

# NOTICE OF PUBLIC HEARING OF THE URBANA CITY COUNCIL COMMITTEE OF THE WHOLE

A public hearing to approve a proposed property tax increase for the City of Urbana for 2023 will be held on December 4, 2023 at 7:00 p.m. at the City of Urbana Council Chambers, 400 S. Vine Street, Urbana, IL 61801.

The corporate and special purpose property taxes extended or abated for 2022 were \$9,361,181.96. The proposed corporate and special service property taxes to be levied for 2023 are \$10,265,792. This represents an 9.66% increase over the previous year.

The property taxes extended for debt service and public building commission leases for 2022 were \$0. The estimated property taxes to be levied for debt service and public building commission leases for 2023 are \$0. This represents a 0.00% increase over the previous year.

The total property taxes extended or abated for 2022 were \$9,361,181.96. The estimated total property taxes to be levied for 2023 are \$10,265,792. This represents an 9.66% increase over the previous year.

## Candidate filing begins Monday, signaling official start of cycle

Monday morning marks the official beginming of the 2024 election cycle in Illinois, opening up the weeklong period when candidates for local, state, congressions and judicial races are re quired to turn in the sig-natures they've spent the last two months collect-

ing to get on the ballot.

filing has traditionally taken on a party
atmosphere, as candidates

and staff line up outside the Illinois State Board of Dections office in Spring-field, where the line often reaches past the Chuck E. Cheese storefront, roughly 100 yards down from the board's entrance in the capital city strip mall.

Those who get in line before 8 am. are entered into a lottery drawing to be placed atop the ballot for their respective position. The lottery drawing is scheduled for Dec. 13.

Though many candidates line up before fling opens, elections board spokesperson Matt Dietrich said he hasn't seen any studies that prove being first on a primary ballot actually provides any advantage.

Still, "political candidates, if they sense that there may be any type of advantage to something, they'll go out of their way." Dietrich said.

Some candidates also try for another myth of advantage by waiting until the last hour of the last day of the filing period, Dec. 4 from 4 to 5 p.m. This pool of candidates is entered into a lottery to be at the bottom of the list in their respective races.

Candidates can file period, the control of the list in their respective races.

Candidates can file period from Nov. 27 through Dec. 4 at the elections office for any of the 17 U.S. House of Representatives seats, 141 Illinois General Assembly seats or 77 judicial vacancies.

After filing, the board opens a period for challenges to candidate petitions. Typically, opponents or party operatives will attempt to knock a new-comer off the ballot for signatures that may not have been collected properly, or in some cases are proven to be fraudulent.

The board will certify the primary ballot at its languary meeting and the

primary election is sched-uled for March 19.
This filing day signals a return to normal from the last state election cy-cle, which was slowed by delays in 2020 U.S. Census data that caused a chain reaction — slowing the process of redistricting in 2021 and changing Illi-nois' typical mid-March primary to a June prima-ry last year Instead of the usual November can-didate filing in 2021, the

Board of Elections pushed

Board of Elections pushed it to March 2022.
Dietrich sald it was necessary as candidates needed the new maps — which had been challenged in court — finalized before they could start passing petitions for the new districts they sought to run in.

Election security
Even before petitions
are filed, election authorities in Illinois are trying to

get ahead of both conspiracy theories and genuine questions about election security and integrity that have continued to circulate and evolve on social media during the past several election cycles.

In late September anumber of downstate county clerks hosted a series of coordinated news conferences to send the message that if constituents are concerned about election integrity, they should visit their local county clerks office to learn how the process is actually handled from start to finish. In a Capitol Cast interview this fall, Tazewell County Clerk John Ackerman said that since 2016, county clerks throughout the state of Illinois have seen "unprecedented attention focused on elections."

"A lot of misinforma-

"A lot of misinformation [is] being placed out there," Ackerman said. "Two presidential cycles in a row, Before we got to the third one, if you just keep doing the same thing, you'll get the same result." Ackerman said he tries

to tell people, "you know who we are, we're in the community, our kids go to the same schools, we shop at the same supermar kets.


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
On the podcast in September, Dietrich emphasized that the work of running elections is largely decentralized; the Board of Elections only provides administrative compared to of Elections only provided administrative support to Illinois' 108 local election authorities, "They do all of the voter registration, they do all of the voter list maintenance

on a daily basis, they re-cruit the election judges, they rent out the polling places," he said. One increased securi-

one increased security measure requires that no one except Board of Elections employees and candidates filing their signatures will be allowed in the petition filing room next week.
